Welcome

Welcome to the Gwinnett County Adult Drug Court. This Handbook is designed to answer your questions and provide overall information about the Drug Court Program. As a participant, you will be expected to follow the instructions given in Drug Court by the Judge and comply with the treatment plan developed for you by the case manager and treatment team.

This Handbook will detail what is expected of you as a Drug Court participant. It will review general program information.

The premise of drug court is to assist those with non-violent drug charges to overcome their drug addictions. Once accepted into this intensive drug treatment program you will obtain a two-fold benefit. One, you will receive cost effective quality drug treatment and two, your criminal drug charges will be dismissed upon successful completion of the treatment program.

Overview

Drug Court is a four-phase intervention program for adults who have pled guilty to one or more non-violent drug offenses and who are having difficulty staying clean and sober. It is a collaborative effort between in the Superior Court, District Attorney's Office, Defense Attorney's, police agencies, Probation and drug treatment programs. By working together, they seek to provide a variety of programs and consistent supervision geared toward supporting and helping you maintain a drug-free life. Drug Court involves frequent court appearances, random drug testing as well as group and individual counseling. The Court awards incentives for compliant behavior and imposes sanctions for negative behavior. Participants who do not comply with the rules may be placed in short-term custody, moved back to the previous phase of drug court or a variety of other sanctions. They may also be terminated from Drug Court. All of the staff working with Drug Court will assist you to be sure you understand what is expected of you.

The Drug Court Team

The Drug Court Judge will make all decisions regarding your participation in the Drug Court Program with input from the Drug Court Team. In addition to the Judge, the Drug Court Team consists of the following members:

- Defense Attorney (your attorney)
- District Attorney
- Drug Court Coordinator
- Treatment Provider (Road to Recovery)
- Probation Services

Prior to each Drug Court session, the Drug Court Team members familiarize themselves with your progress so that they may discuss that progress with you during the Drug Court session.

Progress Reports

Before your Drug Court hearing, the judge will be given a progress report presented by your Case Manager or Treatment Provider. The progress report will discuss your drug testing results, attendance, participation and cooperation in the treatment program, employment or other requirements that may have been imposed. The judge may ask questions about your progress and discuss any problems you may be having. If you are doing well you may be rewarded with reduced program requirements or, at times, other incentives like movie tickets. If your progress reports show that you are not doing well, the judge will discuss this with you and determine future action, which could include a sanction in order to help you remember your goals in the program. Sanctions can be anything from increased program requirements to jail custody.

Drug Court Hearings

As a Drug Court participant, you will be required to appear in Drug Court on a regular basis. The number of times you must appear depends upon the phase of drug court you are currently in. Failure to appear will result in a warrant being issued for your arrest and detention in jail until you can appear before the court. If you have questions about your court appearances you may contact your Case Manager. Drug Court is scheduled every Friday from 10:00 until Noon.

Your behavior from the time you leave your automobile until you arrive in the courtroom should reflect positively on your Drug Court Treatment Program. Your attire shall **NOT** include shorts, tank tops, halter-tops, hats, sunglasses, or excessively baggy clothing. Additionally, you shall **NOT** wear clothes displaying offensive language, advertising alcohol or other drugs. Loud and boisterous behavior is unacceptable. **You must be punctual.**

Court is called to order every Friday morning at 10:00. (You will be advised of exceptions or changes to this schedule.) Once in the courtroom, conversations should be minimal, and you are to remain seated unless directed otherwise. You are not to read or sleep in the courtroom. No food, drink, pagers, cell phones, or other distracting items are allowed. You are responsible for your guests and/or children.



You must be punctual. Court is called to order every Friday morning at 10:00.

When addressed by the Judge, you should stand and respond respectfully. For example, "Yes" and "No" or "Yes, sir" and "No, ma'am" are appropriate. Speak clearly and directly to the

Bench and remain in front of the Judge until dismissed.

Drug Court Fees


Throughout your attendance in the Drug Court Program, you are required to contribute financially through program fees. You will be charged \$165.00 per month. Payment must be made to the Program Coordinator or Case Manager.

Failure to keep your account balance under \$165.00 will result in sanctions until your account is caught up. It is expected that your account will be paid in full monthly.

Additionally, as noted later under Drug Testing, a \$35 fee will be charged to your account if you deny use and your urine sample is confirmed positive by the lab.

If you cannot meet your financial obligations, it is your responsibility to discuss your situation with the program coordinator and develop a solution.

In addition, you will be responsible for a one-time \$65.00 fee to cover your initial interview conducted by a licensed drug counselor. Payment records will be reported to the Judge as part of your regular progress report. All fees must be paid prior to final disposition of your case.

Confidentiality

Federal and State law requires that your identity and privacy be protected. In response to these regulations, Drug Court its case managers and treatment providers have developed policies and procedures that guard your privacy. You will be asked to sign a consent for Disclosure of Confidential Substance Abuse

Summary of Drug Court Rules

1. You will totally abstain from the use of illegal drugs and alcohol.
2. You will inform all treating physicians that you are a recovering addict and may not take narcotic or addictive medications or drugs.
3. You will attend court sessions and treatment sessions as scheduled, submit to random alcohol and drug testing, remain clean and sober and law abiding.
4. You will not associate with people who use or possess drugs, nor will you be present while drugs or alcohol are being used by others.
5. You will not possess any weapons while in the Drug Court program and will disclose the presence of any weapons possessed by anyone else in your household.
6. You will keep the Drug Court team, case manager, treatment provider and police officer liaison informed of your current address and phone number at all time
7. As a condition of participation in the Drug Court program, your person, property, place of residence, vehicle or personal effects may be searched at any time with or without a warrant, and with or without reasonable cause, when required by a probation officer or other law enforcement officer.
8. You will dress appropriately for court and treatment sessions. You are expected to wear a shirt or blouse, pants, dress or skirt of reasonable length. Shoes must be worn at all times. Clothing bearing violent, racist, sexist, drug or alcohol-related themes or promoting or advertising alcohol or drug use is considered inappropriate. Hats may not be worn. Gang attire is also inappropriate.
9. You will abide by all other rules and regulations imposed by the Drug Court Team.

Graduation

Upon your successful completion of the treatment program and satisfaction of all other court requirements including continued sobriety, you will graduate from Drug Court. Once you have graduated the District Attorney will dismiss your drug charges.

Graduation from the Drug Court Program is recognized as a very important event. Your loved ones will be invited to join you at a special ceremony as the Drug Court Team congratulates you for successfully completing Phases I – IV of the Drug Court Program and achieving your goal to establish a drug-free life.

Conclusion

The goal of the Gwinnett County Adult Drug Court Program is to help you achieve a life free of dependence on mind-altering substances. The Judge, court staff and the Drug Court Team are here to guide and assist you, but the final responsibility is yours. To succeed, you must be motivated to make this commitment to a drug free life.

Information. This disclosure of information is for the sole purpose of hearings and reports concerning your specific Drug Court case.

Drug Testing

All participants are to be assigned a drug screen number upon entry to the program. For the duration of your participation in the Gwinnett County Drug Court Program, it is your responsibility to check daily to see if you are required to drug test that day. Drug testing is performed on a random basis; however, a breath or urine specimen may be required at any time. **You must call your treatment provider EACH DAY to verify that you need to submit a drug test. In the event that, for any reason, you cannot access this information by phone, it is your responsibility to report to the treatment center during scheduled drug testing hours.**

All drug testing will be conducted at the treatment facility. Your treatment provider will post drug-testing hours.

You must be punctual and prepared to submit a specimen during the specified hours. **Late arrivals will not be allowed to test and the failure to submit a specimen will be considered a positive screen. Tampering with or diluting a drug screen is grounds for termination from the Gwinnett County Drug Court Program.**

Upon reporting for a drug screen:

1. A staff member must accompany you at all times during drug testing.
2. You must make sure that your name and the date is on your specimen bottle.
3. You must indicate an admission or denial of alcohol or drug use and grant permission for confirmation of results if appropriate.

Honesty is a crucial component for recovery and participation in the Gwinnett County Drug Court

Program. Self-disclosure of use will be considered by the court when sanctions are imposed.

4. You will not be allowed to leave the testing area or to drink excessive fluids until a specimen is rendered.
5. A staff member of the same sex must always witness the sample being given.
6. You may not carry purses, coats, bags, etc. into the testing area.
7. Shirt sleeves should be rolled up to the elbow and you may be requested to remove additional clothing to ensure the validity of a specimen.
8. The test cup must contain a minimum 1/3 level to be adequate for testing.
9. If a drug screen is positive and confirmation is requested, the specimen will be tested again at a qualified testing center. A \$35 confirmation fee will be billed to your account if the lab confirms the positive drug test.

You may not be able to stop using drugs immediately and recovery may not occur overnight. However, all use of illegal drugs will be sanctioned. This is not intended as punishment but to encourage sobriety. Thus, the ultimate goal of drug testing is to provide accountability and confirmation of an individual's progress towards recovery.

2. Mandatory expulsion will result from new felony offenses or violent misdemeanor offenses or driving while under the influence (DUI).
3. Expulsion will be considered by the court upon recommendation of the treatment team after three positive drug screens and after repeated failure to attend mandated treatment programs or court appearances.

Search and Arrest Requirements

As a participant in Drug Court, you are required to submit your person, vehicle, place of residence or area to search and seizure of narcotics, drugs or other contraband at any time of the day or night with or without a search warrant, without prior notice and without probable cause by any peace officer or probation officer. Any law enforcement officer who observes a current participant of Drug Court in any of the following circumstances is authorized to arrest that individual:

- In violation of any criminal law;
- Ingesting a controlled substance, marijuana or alcohol;
- Being under the influence of a controlled substance, marijuana or alcohol;
- Possessing a controlled substance, marijuana or alcohol or drug paraphernalia;
- Being in the presence of a person in possession of controlled substance(s) and a reasonable person in a like position, would conclude that drugs are present.

Participants detained in jail after arrest will be brought before a Drug Court judge for hearing.

COMPLIANCE WITH DRUG COURT RULES WILL RESULT IN REWARDS CALLED "INCENTIVES." FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH RULES MAY RESULT IN SANCTIONS.

Incentives

Upon the recommendation of the Drug Court Team, participants may be given rewards or incentives for compliant behavior. Common incentives are as follows:

- Praise by the Court/Judge
- Sobriety Tokens
- Promotion to next phase
- Certificates of Graduation
- Dismissal of Court Case


Minimum Sanctions

Sanctions include admonition from the judge, increased frequency of court status hearings, increased frequency of drug testing, community service, increased treatment intensity, monitoring, progressively longer incarceration stays, curfews, in-court sentencing, and termination from program and sentencing to include incarceration.

Generally, sanctions are applied as follows:

1. Intermediate sanctions will be used to address non-compliance with the treatment program and/or a positive screen. The ultimate sanction of expulsion and resumption of prosecution of the criminal charge in the normal manner will be reserved for instances of new criminal behavior (other than drug use detected by program screening) and failure to conform to the obligations imposed by the program after less severe sanctions have been imposed.

Treatment Facility

All Drug Court activities and locations may be viewed as an extension of the Gwinnett County Superior Court. Your behavior should reflect that understanding at all times. This includes all contracted treatment locations, community service sites, special events, and any other functions associated with Drug Court activity. Violations of program rules can result in sanctions and/or new criminal charges. All staff members of the Gwinnett County Drug Court are to be considered as officers of the Court, and you are expected to follow their instructions.

1. No alcohol, drugs, weapons, or pocketknives will be brought to these facilities.
2. Groups will begin on time! You must be punctual, as tardiness will result in sanctions. You must attend and participate in the full session to receive credit.
3. Confidentiality is a must. What is said here stays here! There will be **stiff consequences** to any violations of this rule.
4. Free expression of your thoughts and feelings is encouraged; however, violence, threats or intimidation will not be tolerated. Extreme use of profanity is not acceptable.
5. If provided with a break, this time is for smoking, bathroom breaks, and getting a drink. Use this time wisely and return to group on time.
6. Leave group only in an emergency after notifying staff.
7. Pagers and cell phones must be left outside in a locked vehicle. They will be confiscated if they ring or beep during group.

- 8. No visitors allowed. You will be notified of scheduled exceptions to this rule. This includes children and pets.
- 9. Pairing up with another Drug Court participant for an intimate relationship is strongly discouraged.
- 10. Smoking is permitted outside only. **Place cigarette butts in the ash can provided.**
- 11. No littering in parking lot or in building. You must be responsible for assisting in maintaining the cleanliness of the building.
- 12. Destroying or defacing property will lead to sanctions and possible criminal charges.

ATTENDANCE

As a participant in the Gwinnett County Drug Court, you are required to attend all meetings as assigned. Failure to attend will result in sanctions. Special requests to be excused from meetings must be approved by your case manager and/or the Drug Court Team. Participants in Phase 1 should not request leave to miss a drug screen or a group session.

This procedure must be taken in order to miss a drug screen:

- 1. All requests are to be submitted a minimum of two weeks in advance to your case manager.
- 2. All requests must have verified documentation attached. (For example: doctor, school, work, or court letterhead explaining the situation and signed by a person in authority, including a phone number.)

Participants in Phase 1 should not request leave to miss a drug screen.

Drug Court Program Rules

As a participant you will be required to abide by the rules outlined in the participant contract, including, but not limited to the following:

- 1. Totally abstain from the use of illegal drugs and alcohol.
- 2. Inform your treating physicians that you are a recovering addict and may not take narcotic or addictive medications or drugs.
- 3. Attend court sessions and treatment sessions as scheduled, submit to random alcohol and drug testing, remain clean and sober and law abiding.
- 4. Do not associate with people who use or possess drugs.
- 5. Do not possess any weapons while in the Drug Court program.
- 6. Keep the Drug Court team, case manager, and treatment provider informed of your current address and phone number at all times.
- 7. As a condition of participation in the Drug Court program, your person, property, place of residence, vehicle or personal effects may be searched at any time with or without a warrant, and with or without reasonable cause, when required by a probation officer or other law enforcement officer.
- 8. Dress appropriately for court and treatment sessions.
- 9. Pay fees totaling \$165.00 per month for your treatment as directed by the Drug Court Judge. If at anytime you become delinquent on this account by more than 30 days, you will be subject to sanctions, up to and including incarceration.
- 10. Abide by all other rules and regulations imposed by the Drug Court Team.

Phase Four - Maintenance of Recovery and Responsibility to Self and Others

Duration: 4 months

- Drug Court attendance **every four weeks**.
- At least 1 random urine tests per month.
- 2 group sessions per week.
- 1 Twelve Step (AA/NA) meetings per week.
- You must be clean and sober for a period of a minimum of six months prior to graduation.

Termination from Drug Court

Warrants, new arrests or a violation of any aspect of your treatment plan may result in your being terminated from the Drug Court Program. Other violations, which could result in termination, include the following:

- Missing and/or positive drug tests;
- Altered drug test;
- Demonstrating a lack of program response by failing to cooperate with the case manager or treatment program;
- Violence or threat of violence directed at treatment staff, other participants of the program or other clients of the treatment providers;

3. The Drug Court staff will screen requests, and only if they are recommended will they be presented to the Judge for consideration.

4. The Drug Court Judge will inform you on Friday morning of his/her decision on the requests that the staff recommends.

Only legitimate excuses will be considered. For example, birthdays, anniversaries, vacations, concerts...will not be considered. More leeway may be given to senior participants. In the event of a sudden illness and/or death of immediate family, of course, proceed as needed. (Immediate family includes spouse, children, siblings, parents, and grandparents only.) Contact your case manager by phone on the next working day and obtain proof of relationship, medical records, or an obituary to be submitted upon your return to treatment.

MEDICATION

As you will learn in the Drug Court Program, cross addiction is real. Many of you were already addicted to more than one substance when you started Drug Court, but only had one "favorite" substance. You will find it quite easy to change from one mood-altering substance to another and continue to be addicted. As long as you continue to manipulate your mood with a substance rather than *new* thoughts and *new* activities, you will remain cross-addicted.

There are many reasons that you may continue to feel the need to use a variety of substances. The first thing that comes to mind is *insomnia (sleeplessness)* and you may be tempted to return to using sleeping medications within a short period of time because of poorly developed abilities to get yourself to sleep (these skills can be developed: warm milk, reading, meditation, etc.).

Pain is the second most common reason and if you choose to use mood-altering analgesics (pain-killers), especially any of the narcotic drugs (Lortab, Percocet, Darvocet, Darvon, etc.) you are

extremely likely to eventually return to your drug of choice because this will short-circuit your ability to control impulsive action. You have to be very cautious when you become physically ill, even with respiratory diseases (colds, flu, or pneumonia) because many of the drugs used to treat these conditions cause mood changes and decreased ability to control impulses. There are many compounds that will cause you to crave a drink/drug...many cough syrups have narcotics in them.

It is difficult to remember which drugs to avoid and so this list of medications has been prepared for you...what you can take and what you must avoid. ***You have to take responsibility for all of your future drug use*** because not every physician, pharmacist, or dentist knows about the nature of your condition and what you have learned. If you have a particular problem, be sure and discuss it with your case manager. **No drug of any kind is to be taken without prior notice to your treatment provider.**

LET YOUR PHYSICIANS, DENTISTS, PHARMICISTS, AND ALL OTHER PERSONS THAT WILL BE INVOLVED IN YOUR RECEIVING MEDICATIONS KNOW THAT YOU ARE IN RECOVERY. THIS IS EXTREMELY IMPORTANT IN THE MAINTENANCE OF YOUR RECOVERY!

In the following pages will be lists of drugs you can and cannot take safely. Please pay close attention to the medications that you receive to insure long-term health and recovery from addiction.

Phases of Drug Court

Drug Court is an 18-month to 24-month program divided into four phases, including a transition phase. A participant must successfully complete each phase before transitioning to the next phase. Each phase has a key concept or focus.

Phase One – Recovery and Responsibility to Self

Duration: 2 months minimum

- Drug Court attendance weekly.
- At least 2 random urine tests per week.
- 3 group sessions per week.
- 3 Twelve Step (AA/NA) meetings per week.

Phase Two - Maintenance of Recovery and Responsibility to Others

Duration: 6 months

- Drug Court attendance **every other week.**
- At least 2 random urine tests per week.
- 3 group sessions per week.
- 3 Twelve Step (AA/NA) meetings per week.

Phase Three - Maintenance of Recovery and Responsibility to Self and Others

Duration: 6 months

- Drug Court attendance **every three weeks.**
- At least 1 random urine tests per week.
- 2 group sessions per week.
- 2 Twelve Step (AA/NA) meetings per week.

If you elect to continue use without authorization from the Drug Court team, positive drug screens will be considered sanctionable and termination a potential end result.
